Anyone travelling by car should park in the car park (limited spaces) and not on the roadway. n remembrance of the end of the war and the millions who were killed or came home dreadfully wounded, Beacons of Light will be lit around the country at 7pm on 11th November 2018.

The event will also commemorate the huge army of men and women on the home front who, often in dangerous and exhausting conditions, underpinned the war effort - keeping the wheels of industry turning and bringing home the harvests. St Anne's Well

St. Anne's was a natural well with a great flow of water, which was said to cure rheumatic patients. It was back-filled in the late nineteenth century, when the water was 'poisoned' by the body of a dead animal. In the past, the ancient stocks were positioned close to the well, which was also known as a Stocks Well (dedicated to St. Anne). Old maps show Stocks Well Lane leading to the stocks. Many believe the well to be late Medieval in origin, when the cult of St. Anne had become widespread in England.
